1 **SEC. 2. DEFINITIONS.**

2 In this Act:

3 (1) SECRETARY.—The term “Secretary”  
 4 means—

5 (A) the Secretary of the Interior, with re-  
 6 spect to public land administered by the Sec-  
 7 retary of the Interior; or

8 (B) the Secretary of Agriculture, with re-  
 9 spect to National Forest System land.

10 (2) STATE.—The term “State” means the State  
 11 of Oregon.

12 **TITLE I—RECREATION AREAS**

13 **SEC. 101. ROGUE CANYON AND MOLALLA RECREATION**  
 14 **AREAS, OREGON.**

15 (a) DESIGNATION OF ROGUE CANYON AND MOLALLA  
 16 RECREATION AREAS.—For the purposes of protecting,  
 17 conserving, and enhancing the unique and nationally im-  
 18 portant recreational, ecological, scenic, cultural, water-  
 19 shed, and fish and wildlife values of the areas, the fol-

1 lowing areas in the State are designated as recreation  
2 areas for management by the Secretary in accordance with  
3 subsection (c):

4           (1) ROGUE CANYON RECREATION AREA.—The  
5           approximately 98,150 acres of Bureau of Land Man-  
6           agement land within the boundary generally depicted  
7           on the map entitled “Rogue Canyon Recreation  
8           Area” and dated September 26, 2018, which is des-  
9           ignated as the “Rogue Canyon Recreation Area”.

10           (2) MOLALLA RECREATION AREA.—The ap-  
11           proximately 29,884 acres of Bureau of Land Man-  
12           agement land within the boundary generally depicted  
13           on the map entitled “Molalla Recreation Area” and  
14           dated September 26, 2018, which is designated as  
15           the “Molalla Recreation Area”.

16           (b) MAPS AND LEGAL DESCRIPTIONS.—

17           (1) IN GENERAL.—As soon as practicable after  
18           the date of enactment of this Act, the Secretary  
19           shall a prepare a map and legal description of each  
20           recreation area designated by subsection (a).

21           (2) EFFECT.—The maps and legal descriptions  
22           prepared under paragraph (1) shall have the same  
23           force and effect as if included in this Act, except  
24           that the Secretary may correct any minor errors in  
25           the maps and legal descriptions.

1           (3) PUBLIC AVAILABILITY.—The maps and  
2 legal descriptions prepared under paragraph (1)  
3 shall be available for public inspection in the appro-  
4 priate offices of the Bureau of Land Management.

5 (c) ADMINISTRATION.—

6           (1) APPLICABLE LAW.—The Secretary shall ad-  
7 minister each recreation area designated by sub-  
8 section (a)—

9                   (A) in a manner that conserves, protects,  
10 and enhances the purposes for which the recre-  
11 ation area is established; and

12                   (B) in accordance with—

13                           (i) this section;

14                           (ii) the Federal Land Policy and Man-  
15 agement Act of 1976 (43 U.S.C. 1701 et  
16 seq.); and

17                           (iii) other applicable laws.

18           (2) USES.—The Secretary shall only allow those  
19 uses of a recreation area designated by subsection  
20 (a) that are consistent with the purposes for which  
21 the recreation area is established.

22           (3) ROAD CONSTRUCTION.—

23                   (A) IN GENERAL.—Except as the Sec-  
24 retary determines necessary for public safety,  
25 no new permanent or temporary roads shall be

1 constructed (other than the repair and mainte-  
2 nance of existing roads) within a recreation  
3 area designated by subsection (a).

4 (B) EFFECT.—Nothing in this paragraph  
5 affects the administration by the Secretary of  
6 the Molalla Forest Road in accordance with ap-  
7 plicable resource management plans.

8 (4) VEGETATION MANAGEMENT.—Nothing in  
9 this section prohibits the Secretary from conducting  
10 vegetation management projects within a recreation  
11 area designated by subsection (a) to the extent con-  
12 sistent with the purposes of the recreation area.

13 (5) WITHDRAWAL.—Subject to valid existing  
14 rights, all Federal surface and subsurface land with-  
15 in a recreation area designated by subsection (a) is  
16 withdrawn from all forms of—

17 (A) entry, appropriation, or disposal under  
18 the public land laws;

19 (B) location, entry, and patent under the  
20 mining laws; and

21 (C) laws pertaining to mineral and geo-  
22 thermal leasing and mineral materials.

23 (d) ADJACENT MANAGEMENT.—Nothing in this sec-  
24 tion creates any protective perimeter or buffer zone  
25 around a recreation area designated by subsection (a).

1 **TITLE II—ADDITIONAL WILD**  
2 **AND SCENIC RIVER DESIGNA-**  
3 **TIONS AND TECHNICAL COR-**  
4 **RECTIONS**

5 **SEC. 201. ADDITIONS TO ROGUE WILD AND SCENIC RIVER.**

6 (a) IN GENERAL.—Section 3(a) of the Wild and Sce-  
7 nic Rivers Act (16 U.S.C. 1274(a)) is amended by striking  
8 paragraph (5) and inserting the following:

9 “(5) ROGUE, OREGON.—

10 “(A) IN GENERAL.—The segment of the  
11 river extending from the mouth of the Apple-  
12 gate River downstream to the Lobster Creek  
13 Bridge, to be administered by the Secretary of  
14 the Interior or the Secretary of Agriculture, as  
15 agreed to by the Secretaries of the Interior and  
16 Agriculture or as directed by the President.

17 “(B) ADDITIONS.—In addition to the seg-  
18 ment described in subparagraph (A), there are  
19 designated the following segments in the Rogue  
20 River:

21 “(i) KELSEY CREEK.—The approxi-  
22 mately 6.8-mile segment of Kelsey Creek  
23 from the Wild Rogue Wilderness boundary  
24 in T. 32 S., R. 9 W., sec. 25, Willamette

1 Meridian, to the confluence with the Rogue  
2 River, as a wild river.

3 “(ii) EAST FORK KELSEY CREEK.—

4 “(I) SCENIC RIVER.—The ap-  
5 proximately 0.2-mile segment of East  
6 Fork Kelsey Creek from headwaters  
7 downstream to the Wild Rogue Wil-  
8 derness boundary in T. 33 S., R. 8  
9 W., sec. 5, Willamette Meridian, as a  
10 scenic river.

11 “(II) WILD RIVER.—The ap-  
12 proximately 4.6-mile segment of East  
13 Fork Kelsey Creek from the Wild  
14 Rogue Wilderness boundary in T. 33  
15 S., R. 8 W., sec. 5, Willamette Merid-  
16 ian, to the confluence with Kelsey  
17 Creek, as a wild river.

18 “(iii) WHISKY CREEK.—

19 “(I) RECREATIONAL RIVER.—  
20 The approximately 1.6-mile segment  
21 of Whisky Creek from the confluence  
22 of the East Fork and West Fork to  
23 the south boundary of the non-Fed-  
24 eral land in T. 33 S., R. 8 W., sec.

1 17, Willamette Meridian, as a rec-  
2 reational river.

3 “(II) WILD RIVER.—The ap-  
4 proximately 1.2-mile segment of Whis-  
5 ky Creek from road 33-8-23 to the  
6 confluence with the Rogue River, as a  
7 wild river.

8 “(iv) EAST FORK WHISKY CREEK.—

9 “(I) SCENIC RIVER.—The ap-  
10 proximately 0.9-mile segment of East  
11 Fork Whisky Creek from its head-  
12 waters to Wild Rogue Wilderness  
13 boundary in T. 33 S., R. 8 W., sec.  
14 11, Willamette Meridian, as a scenic  
15 river.

16 “(II) WILD RIVER.—The ap-  
17 proximately 2.6-mile segment of East  
18 Fork Whisky Creek from the Wild  
19 Rogue Wilderness boundary in T. 33  
20 S., R. 8 W., sec. 11, Willamette Me-  
21 ridian, downstream to road 33-8-26  
22 crossing, as a wild river.

23 “(III) RECREATIONAL RIVER.—  
24 The approximately 0.3-mile segment  
25 of East Fork Whisky Creek from road



1                   33-8-26 to the confluence with Whis-  
2                   ky Creek, as a recreational river.

3                   “(v) WEST FORK WHISKY CREEK.—  
4                   The approximately 4.8-mile segment of  
5                   West Fork Whisky Creek from its head-  
6                   waters to the confluence with the East  
7                   Fork Whisky Creek, as a wild river.

8                   “(vi) BIG WINDY CREEK.—

9                   “(I) SCENIC RIVER.—The ap-  
10                  proximately 1.5-mile segment of Big  
11                  Windy Creek from its headwaters to  
12                  road 34-9-17.1, as a scenic river.

13                  “(II) WILD RIVER.—The ap-  
14                  proximately 5.8-mile segment of Big  
15                  Windy Creek from road 34-9-17.1 to  
16                  the confluence with the Rogue River,  
17                  as a wild river.

18                  “(vii) EAST FORK BIG WINDY  
19                  CREEK.—

20                  “(I) SCENIC RIVER.—The ap-  
21                  proximately 0.2-mile segment of East  
22                  Fork Big Windy Creek from its head-  
23                  waters to road 34-8-36, as a scenic  
24                  river.

1                   “(II) WILD RIVER.—The ap-  
2                   proximately 3.7-mile segment of East  
3                   Fork Big Windy Creek from road 34-  
4                   8-36 to the confluence with Big  
5                   Windy Creek, as a wild river.

6                   “(viii) LITTLE WINDY CREEK.—

7                   “(I) SCENIC RIVER.—The ap-  
8                   proximately 1.2-mile segment of Little  
9                   Windy Creek from its headwaters to  
10                  the Wild Rogue Wilderness boundary  
11                  in T. 33 S., R. 9 W., sec. 34, Willam-  
12                  ette Meridian, as a scenic river.

13                  “(II) WILD RIVER.—The ap-  
14                  proximately 1.9-mile segment of Little  
15                  Windy Creek from the Wild Rogue  
16                  Wilderness boundary in T. 33 S., R.  
17                  9 W., sec. 34, Willamette Meridian, to  
18                  the confluence with the Rogue River,  
19                  as a wild river.

20                  “(ix) HOWARD CREEK.—

21                  “(I) SCENIC RIVER.—The ap-  
22                  proximately 3.5-mile segment of How-  
23                  ard Creek from its headwaters to road  
24                  34-9-34, as a scenic river.

1                   “(II) WILD RIVER.—The ap-  
2                   proximately 6.9-mile segment of How-  
3                   ard Creek from 0.1 miles downstream  
4                   of road 34-9-34 to the confluence with  
5                   the Rogue River, as a wild river.

6                   “(III) WILD RIVER.—The ap-  
7                   proximately 3.5-mile segment of Anna  
8                   Creek from its headwaters to the con-  
9                   fluence with Howard Creek, as a wild  
10                  river.

11                  “(x) MULE CREEK.—

12                  “(I) SCENIC RIVER.—The ap-  
13                  proximately 3.5-mile segment of Mule  
14                  Creek from its headwaters down-  
15                  stream to the Wild Rogue Wilderness  
16                  boundary as a scenic river.

17                  “(II) WILD RIVER.—The ap-  
18                  proximately 7.8-mile segment of Mule  
19                  Creek from the Wild Rogue Wilder-  
20                  ness boundary in T. 32 S., R. 9 W.,  
21                  sec. 29, Willamette Meridian, to the  
22                  confluence with the Rogue River, as a  
23                  wild river.

24                  “(xi) MISSOURI CREEK.—

1                   “(I) SCENIC RIVER.—The ap-  
2                   proximately 3.1-mile segment of Mis-  
3                   souri Creek from its headwaters  
4                   downstream to the Wild Rogue Wil-  
5                   derness boundary in T. 33 S., R. 10  
6                   W., sec. 24, Willamette Meridian, as a  
7                   scenic river.

8                   “(II) WILD RIVER.—The ap-  
9                   proximately 1.6-mile segment of Mis-  
10                  souri Creek from the Wild Rogue Wil-  
11                  derness boundary in T. 33 S., R. 10  
12                  W., sec. 24, Willamette Meridian, to  
13                  the confluence with the Rogue River,  
14                  as a wild river.

15                  “(xii) JENNY CREEK.—

16                  “(I) SCENIC RIVER.—The ap-  
17                  proximately 3.1-mile segment of  
18                  Jenny Creek from its headwaters  
19                  downstream to the Wild Rogue Wil-  
20                  derness boundary in T. 33 S., R. 9  
21                  W., sec. 28, Willamette Meridian, as a  
22                  scenic river.

23                  “(II) WILD RIVER.—The ap-  
24                  proximately 1.8-mile segment of  
25                  Jenny Creek from the Wild Rogue

1 Wilderness boundary in T. 33 S., R.  
2 9 W., sec. 28, Willamette Meridian, to  
3 the confluence with the Rogue River,  
4 as a wild river.

5 “(xiii) RUM CREEK.—

6 “(I) SCENIC RIVER.—The ap-  
7 proximately 2.2-mile segment of Rum  
8 Creek from its headwaters to the Wild  
9 Rogue Wilderness boundary in T. 34  
10 S., R. 8 W., sec. 9, Willamette Merid-  
11 ian, as a scenic river.

12 “(II) WILD RIVER.—The ap-  
13 proximately 2.2-mile segment of Rum  
14 Creek from the Wild Rogue Wilder-  
15 ness boundary in T. 34 S., R. 8 W.,  
16 sec. 9, Willamette Meridian, to the  
17 confluence with the Rogue River, as a  
18 wild river.

19 “(xiv) EAST FORK RUM CREEK.—

20 “(I) SCENIC RIVER.—The ap-  
21 proximately 0.8-mile segment of East  
22 Fork Rum Creek from its headwaters  
23 to the Wild Rogue Wilderness bound-  
24 ary in T. 34 S., R. 8 W., sec. 10, Wil-  
25 lamette Meridian, as a scenic river.

1                   “(II) WILD RIVER.—The ap-  
2                   proximately 1.3-mile segment of East  
3                   Fork Rum Creek from the Wild  
4                   Rogue Wilderness boundary in T. 34  
5                   S., R. 8 W., sec. 10, Willamette Me-  
6                   ridian, to the confluence with Rum  
7                   Creek, as a wild river.

8                   “(xv) WILDCAT CREEK.—The approxi-  
9                   mately 1.7-mile segment of Wildeat Creek  
10                  from its headwaters downstream to the  
11                  confluence with the Rogue River, as a wild  
12                  river.

13                  “(xvi) MONTGOMERY CREEK.—The  
14                  approximately 1.8-mile segment of Mont-  
15                  gomery Creek from its headwaters down-  
16                  stream to the confluence with the Rogue  
17                  River, as a wild river.

18                  “(xvii) HEWITT CREEK.—

19                  “(I) SCENIC RIVER.—The ap-  
20                  proximately 1.4-mile segment of Hew-  
21                  itt Creek from its headwaters to the  
22                  Wild Rogue Wilderness boundary in  
23                  T. 33 S., R. 9 W., sec. 19, Willamette  
24                  Meridian, as a scenic river.

2 in T. 33 S., R. 10 W., sec. 1, Willamette  
3 Meridian, to the confluence with the Rogue  
4 River, as a wild river.

5 “(xxi) MEADOW CREEK.—The ap-  
6 proximately 4.1-mile segment of Meadow  
7 Creek from its headwaters to the con-  
8 fluence with the Rogue River, as a wild  
9 river.

10 “(xxii) RUSSIAN CREEK.—The ap-  
11 proximately 2.5-mile segment of Russian  
12 Creek from the Wild Rogue Wilderness  
13 boundary in T. 33 S., R. 8 W., sec. 20,  
14 Willamette Meridian, to the confluence  
15 with the Rogue River, as a wild river.

16 “(xxiii) ALDER CREEK.—The approxi-  
17 mately 1.2-mile segment of Alder Creek  
18 from its headwaters to the confluence with  
19 the Rogue River, as a wild river.

20 “(xxiv) BOOZE CREEK.—The approxi-  
21 mately 1.5-mile segment of Booze Creek  
22 from its headwaters to the confluence with  
23 the Rogue River, as a wild river.

24 “(xxv) BRONCO CREEK.—The ap-  
25 proximately 1.8-mile segment of Bronco



1 Creek from its headwaters to the con-  
2 fluence with the Rogue River, as a wild  
3 river.

4 “(xxvi) COPSEY CREEK.—The ap-  
5 proximately 1.5-mile segment of Copsey  
6 Creek from its headwaters to the con-  
7 fluence with the Rogue River, as a wild  
8 river.

9 “(xxvii) CORRAL CREEK.—The ap-  
10 proximately 0.5-mile segment of Corral  
11 Creek from its headwaters to the con-  
12 fluence with the Rogue River, as a wild  
13 river.

14 “(xxviii) COWLEY CREEK.—The ap-  
15 proximately 0.9-mile segment of Cowley  
16 Creek from its headwaters to the con-  
17 fluence with the Rogue River, as a wild  
18 river.

19 “(xxix) DITCH CREEK.—The approxi-  
20 mately 1.8-mile segment of Ditch Creek  
21 from the Wild Rogue Wilderness boundary  
22 in T. 33 S., R. 9 W., sec. 5, Willamette  
23 Meridian, to its confluence with the Rogue  
24 River, as a wild river.

1                   “(xxx) FRANCIS CREEK.—The ap-  
2                   proximately 0.9-mile segment of Francis  
3                   Creek from its headwaters to the con-  
4                   fluence with the Rogue River, as a wild  
5                   river.

6                   “(xxxii) LONG GULCH.—

7                   “(I) SCENIC RIVER.—The ap-  
8                   proximately 1.4-mile segment of Long  
9                   Gulch from its headwaters to the Wild  
10                  Rogue Wilderness boundary in T. 33  
11                  S., R. 10 W., sec. 23, Willamette Me-  
12                  ridian, as a scenic river.

13                  “(II) WILD RIVER.—The ap-  
14                  proximately 1.1-mile segment of Long  
15                  Gulch from the Wild Rogue Wilder-  
16                  ness boundary in T. 33 S., R. 10 W.,  
17                  sec. 23, Willamette Meridian, to the  
18                  confluence with the Rogue River, as a  
19                  wild river.

20                  “(xxxiii) BAILEY CREEK.—

21                  “(I) SCENIC RIVER.—The ap-  
22                  proximately 1.4-mile segment of Bai-  
23                  ley Creek from its headwaters to the  
24                  Wild Rogue Wilderness boundary on  
25                  the west section line of T. 34 S., R.

1 8 W., sec. 14, Willamette Meridian, as  
2 a scenic river.

3 “(II) WILD RIVER.—The ap-  
4 proximately 1.7-mile segment of Bai-  
5 ley Creek from the west section line of  
6 T. 34 S., R.8 W., sec. 14, Willamette  
7 Meridian, to the confluence of the  
8 Rogue River, as a wild river.

9 “(xxxiii) SHADY CREEK.—The ap-  
10 proximately 0.7-mile segment of Shady  
11 Creek from its headwaters to the con-  
12 fluence with the Rogue River, as a wild  
13 river.

14 “(xxxiv) SLIDE CREEK.—

15 “(I) SCENIC RIVER.—The ap-  
16 proximately 0.5-mile segment of Slide  
17 Creek from its headwaters to road 33-  
18 9-6, as a scenic river.

19 “(II) WILD RIVER.—The ap-  
20 proximately 0.7-mile section of Slide  
21 Creek from road 33-9-6 to the con-  
22 fluence with the Rogue River, as a  
23 wild river.”.

24 (b) MANAGEMENT.—Each river segment designated  
25 by subparagraph (B) of section 3(a)(5) of the Wild and

1 Scenic Rivers Act (16 U.S.C. 1274(a)(5)) (as added by  
2 subsection (a)) shall be managed as part of the Rogue  
3 Wild and Scenic River.

4 (c) WITHDRAWAL.—Subject to valid existing rights,  
5 the Federal land within the boundaries of the river seg-  
6 ments designated by subparagraph (B) of section 3(a)(5)  
7 of the Wild and Scenic Rivers Act (16 U.S.C. 1274(a)(5)),  
8 (as added by subsection (a)) is withdrawn from all forms  
9 of—

10 (1) entry, appropriation, or disposal under the  
11 public land laws;

12 (2) location, entry, and patent under the mining  
13 laws; and

14 (3) disposition under all laws pertaining to min-  
15 eral and geothermal leasing or mineral materials.

16 (d) ADDITIONAL PROTECTIONS FOR ROGUE RIVER  
17 TRIBUTARIES.—

18 (1) LICENSING BY COMMISSION.—The Federal  
19 Energy Regulatory Commission shall not license the  
20 construction of any dam, water conduit, reservoir,  
21 powerhouse, transmission line, or other project  
22 works on or directly affecting any stream described  
23 in paragraph (4).

24 (2) OTHER AGENCIES.—

1           (A) IN GENERAL.—No department or  
2           agency of the United States shall assist by loan,  
3           grant, license, or otherwise in the construction  
4           of any water resources project on or directly af-  
5           fecting any stream segment that is described in  
6           paragraph (4), except to maintain or repair  
7           water resources projects in existence on the  
8           date of enactment of this Act.

9           (B) EFFECT.—Nothing in this paragraph  
10          prohibits any department or agency of the  
11          United States in assisting by loan, grant, li-  
12          cense, or otherwise, a water resources project—

13                 (i) the primary purpose of which is ec-  
14                 ological or aquatic restoration;

15                 (ii) that provides a net benefit to  
16                 water quality and aquatic resources; and

17                 (iii) that is consistent with protecting  
18                 and enhancing the values for which the  
19                 river was designated.

20          (3) WITHDRAWAL.—Subject to valid existing  
21          rights, the Federal land located within  $\frac{1}{4}$  mile on ei-  
22          ther side of the stream segments described in para-  
23          graph (4), is withdrawn from all forms of—

24                 (A) entry, appropriation, or disposal under  
25                 the public land laws;

1 (B) location, entry, and patent under the  
2 mining laws; and

3 (C) disposition under all laws pertaining to  
4 mineral and geothermal leasing or mineral ma-  
5 terials.

6 (4) DESCRIPTION OF STREAM SEGMENTS.—The  
7 following are the stream segments referred to in  
8 paragraph (1):

9 (A) KELSEY CREEK.—The approximately  
10 2.5-mile segment of Kelsey Creek from its  
11 headwaters to the Wild Rogue Wilderness  
12 boundary in T. 32 S., R. 9 W., sec. 25, Willam-  
13 ette Meridian.

14 (B) GRAVE CREEK.—The approximately  
15 10.2-mile segment of Grave Creek from the east  
16 boundary of T. 34 S., R. 7 W., sec. 1, Willam-  
17 ette Meridian, downstream to the confluence  
18 with the Rogue River.

19 (C) CENTENNIAL GULCH.—The approxi-  
20 mately 2.2-mile segment of Centennial Gulch  
21 from its headwaters to its confluence with the  
22 Rogue River in T. 34 S., R. 7, W., sec. 18, Wil-  
23 lamette Meridian.

23 administered by the Secretary of the Interior as a

5           Creek in T. 41 S., R. 4 E., sec. 3, Willamette Merid-  
6           ian, to be administered by the Secretary of the Inte-

8           “(222) LOBSTER CREEK, OREGON.—The ap-  
9           proximately 5-mile segment from T. 15 S., R. 8 W.,  
10          sec. 35, Willamette Meridian, downstream to the  
11          edge of the Bureau of Land Management boundary  
12          in T. 15 S., R. 8 W., sec. 15, Willamette Meridian,  
13          to be administered by the Secretary of the Interior  
14          as a recreational river.

15          “(223) ELK CREEK, OREGON.—The approxi-  
16          mately 7.3-mile segment from its confluence with  
17          Flat Creek near river mile 9, to the southern edge  
18          of the Army Corps of Engineers boundary in T. 33

## 23         **TITLE III—WILDERNESS AREAS**

### 24         **SEC. 301. EXPANSION OF WILD ROGUE WILDERNESS AREA.**

25                 (a) DEFINITIONS.—In this section:

1           (1) MAP.—The term “map” means the map en-  
2           titled “Rogue Canyon Recreation Area Wild Rogue  
3           Wilderness Additions” and dated September 26,  
4           2018.

5           (2) WILDERNESS ADDITIONS.—The term “Wil-  
6           derness additions” means the land added to the Wild  
7           Rogue Wilderness under subsection (b)(1).

8           (b) EXPANSION OF WILD ROGUE WILDERNESS  
9           AREA.—

10           (1) EXPANSION.—The approximately 59,512  
11           acres of Federal land in the State generally depicted  
12           on the map as “Proposed Wilderness” shall be  
13           added to and administered as part of the Wild  
14           Rogue Wilderness in accordance with the Endan-  
15           gered American Wilderness Act of 1978 (16 U.S.C.  
16           1132 note; Public Law 95–237), except that—

17                   (A) the Secretary of the Interior and the  
18                   Secretary of Agriculture shall administer the  
19                   Federal land under their respective jurisdiction;  
20                   and

21                   (B) any reference in that Act to the Sec-  
22                   retary of Agriculture shall be considered to be  
23                   a reference to the Secretary of Agriculture or  
24                   the Secretary of the Interior, as applicable.

25           (2) MAP; LEGAL DESCRIPTION.—



1           (A) IN GENERAL.—As soon as practicable  
2 after the date of enactment of this Act, the Sec-  
3 retary shall prepare a map and legal description  
4 of the wilderness area designated by paragraph  
5 (1).

6           (B) FORCE OF LAW.—The map and legal  
7 description filed under subparagraph (A) shall  
8 have the same force and effect as if included in  
9 this section, except that the Secretary may cor-  
10 rect typographical errors in the map and legal  
11 description.

12           (C) PUBLIC AVAILABILITY.—The map and  
13 legal description filed under subparagraph (A)  
14 shall be on file and available for public inspec-  
15 tion in the appropriate offices of the Bureau of  
16 Land Management and Forest Service.

17           (3) WITHDRAWAL.—Subject to valid existing  
18 rights, the Wilderness additions are withdrawn from  
19 all forms of—

20                 (A) entry, appropriation, or disposal under  
21 the public land laws;

22                 (B) location, entry, and patent under the  
23 mining laws; and

1 (C) disposition under all laws pertaining to  
2 mineral and geothermal leasing or mineral ma-  
3 terials.

4 (4) TRIBAL RIGHTS.—Nothing in this sub-  
5 section alters, modifies, enlarges, diminishes, or ab-  
6 rogates the treaty rights of any Indian tribe.

7 **SEC. 302. DEVIL’S STAIRCASE WILDERNESS.**

8 (a) DEFINITIONS.—In this section:

9 (1) MAP.—The term “map” means the map en-  
10 titled “Devil’s Staircase Wilderness Proposal” and  
11 dated July 26, 2018.

12 (2) WILDERNESS.—The term “Wilderness”  
13 means the Devil’s Staircase Wilderness designated  
14 by subsection (b).

15 (b) DESIGNATION.—In accordance with the Wilder-  
16 ness Act (16 U.S.C. 1131 et seq.), the approximately  
17 30,621 acres of Forest Service land and Bureau of Land  
18 Management land in the State, as generally depicted on  
19 the map, is designated as wilderness and as a component  
20 of the National Wilderness Preservation System, to be  
21 known as the “Devil’s Staircase Wilderness”.

22 (c) MAP; LEGAL DESCRIPTION.—

23 (1) IN GENERAL.—As soon as practicable after  
24 the date of enactment of this Act, the Secretary

1 shall prepare a map and legal description of the Wil-  
2 derness.

3 (2) FORCE OF LAW.—The map and legal de-  
4 scription prepared under paragraph (1) shall have  
5 the same force and effect as if included in this Act,  
6 except that the Secretary may correct clerical and  
7 typographical errors in the map and legal descrip-  
8 tion.

9 (3) AVAILABILITY.—The map and legal descrip-  
10 tion prepared under paragraph (1) shall be on file  
11 and available for public inspection in the appropriate  
12 offices of the Forest Service and Bureau of Land  
13 Management.

14 (d) ADMINISTRATION.—Subject to valid existing  
15 rights, the area designated as wilderness by this section  
16 shall be administered by the Secretary in accordance with  
17 the Wilderness Act (16 U.S.C. 1131 et seq.), except  
18 that—

19 (1) any reference in that Act to the effective  
20 date shall be considered to be a reference to the date  
21 of enactment of this Act; and

22 (2) any reference in that Act to the Secretary  
23 of Agriculture shall be considered to be a reference  
24 to the Secretary that has jurisdiction over the land  
25 within the Wilderness.

1 (e) FISH AND WILDLIFE.—Nothing in this section af-  
2 fects the jurisdiction or responsibilities of the State with  
3 respect to fish and wildlife in the State.

4 (f) ADJACENT MANAGEMENT.—

5 (1) IN GENERAL.—Nothing in this section cre-  
6 ates any protective perimeter or buffer zone around  
7 the Wilderness.

8 (2) ACTIVITIES OUTSIDE WILDERNESS.—The  
9 fact that a nonwilderness activity or use on land out-  
10 side the Wilderness can be seen or heard within the  
11 Wilderness shall not preclude the activity or use out-  
12 side the boundary of the Wilderness.

13 (g) PROTECTION OF TRIBAL RIGHTS.—Nothing in  
14 this section diminishes any treaty rights of an Indian  
15 tribe.

16 (h) TRANSFER OF ADMINISTRATIVE JURISDIC-  
17 TION.—

18 (1) IN GENERAL.—Administrative jurisdiction  
19 over the approximately 49 acres of Bureau of Land  
20 Management land north of the Umpqua River in T.  
21 21 S., R. 11 W., sec. 32, is transferred from the Bu-  
22 reau of Land Management to the Forest Service.

23 (2) ADMINISTRATION.—The Secretary shall ad-  
24 minister the land transferred by paragraph (1) in  
25 accordance with—

1                   (A) the Act of March 1, 1911 (commonly  
2                   known as the “Weeks Law”) (16 U.S.C. 480 et  
3                   seq.); and

4                   (B) any laws (including regulations) appli-  
5                   cable to the National Forest System.
